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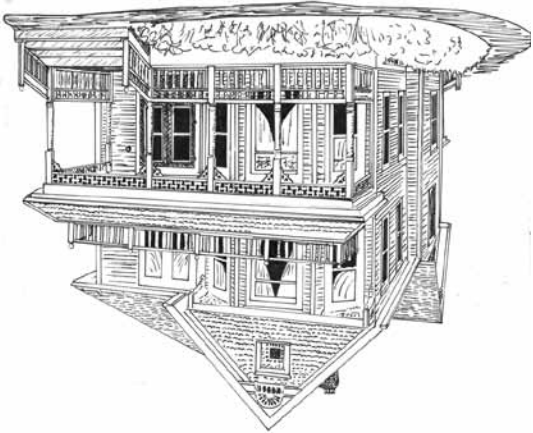

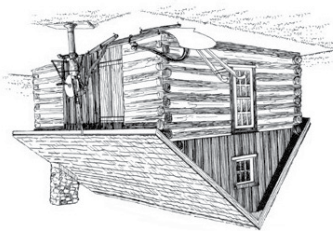

Jerry will talk about one of his latest books, “Simple Things” – which are objects such as an old kerosene lantern from his family farm that brings back a flood of memories. Historic Rowboat Renovated

Board President Dale Marsden and board member Ginny Dodson rode in the restored rowboat and verified that it was watertight! The rowboat is now on display in the new addition of the McFarland Historical Society Museum on Main Street.

165 year-old Skare Cabin Restoration

Again in 2018, maintenance and improvement activities for the historic 165 year-old Skare Cabin were a major work priority for MHS Board.

In the spring, our neighboring property owner removed a large maple tree that had previously shaded the north side of the cabin. Opening up this area not only decreased the problem of debris and mold on the roof and cabin, but the improved visibility also provided the opportunity for some landscape improvements. In July, the Board voted to install a cedar rail fence along the north property line to delineate the boundary and blend in with the landscaping installed by our neighbor.

On July 17, a work group of Wes Licht, Dale Marsden, Don Peterson, Rod Clark and Dick Kohl gathered to unload materials, begin digging the post holes and install the fence. After the first post was in the ground, the crew encountered the remaining roots from the old maple tree which made digging very difficult. Fortunately, Dick Kohl showed his great expertise with a post hole digger and over the course of two work sessions was able to battle the roots and dig the holes, while other members of the crew installed the poles and the rails for the fence. The fence looks very natural in the setting and has helped improve the visual setting for the cabin.



Early in 2018, the Alsmo family donated an old bell, which was mounted in a tree in the Alsmo Farm and was used to call family members to meals. The Board decided to install the bell on a pole at the front of the cabin. While the crew was working on the fence installation, several members also took time to dig a hole for a 4x4 on which the bell was successfully mounted. The Alsmo Farm bell was used during the November celebration of the 100th anniversary of the end of WW1, as bells throughout the country were rung 21 times at exactly 11:00 am on November 11, to honor those who died in that war.

Following up on work started last fall, a crew of Dale Marsden, Wes Licht, Rod Clark, Joe Larson, Bob Kolek and Don Peterson met on October 23 and 25 to apply mortar

daubing to the areas between the logs on the south and west sides of the cabin. In 2018, all the old cracked mortar had been removed from these areas, the logs allow to dry and then repaired. After some trial and error learning about how to mix the materials and the best techniques for applying it, the crew made good progress and finished the work with only two work sessions. The cabin is now well weatherproofed on those sides and we hope the new daubing will last a number of years. Additional work on other sides may be undertaken next year, as needed.

And, they ate yummy homemade cookies donated by many volunteers.

Kathy Krusiec, Judy St. Clair, Vicki Holten and Sherry Blanchar gathered materials and prepared gift baskets and fancy mugs at their own time and expense

and sold most of them. Quite a few McFarland Historical Society books were sold, and over \$300 in donations was generously given by visitors. Thelma Allen took cuttings from the ancient Christmas cactus in the Larson House, planted them in pots and these were sold during the month of December.

In addition to being open for Christmas in the Village, the house was open every Sunday afternoon in December for the general public. On other days of the month, a number of private groups reserved the house for their special events. These included three book clubs, a Red Hat Ladies' club, the McFarland Chamber of Commerce, a homemaker's club, a women's sorority, the Elizabeth Circle from McFarland Lutheran Church, and a neighborhood group from the Town of Dunn. The total number of guests visiting the Larson House in December was 301.

Many visitors filled out the survey form to vote for their favorite room in the house and also to lavish praise on the decorations and the house in general. What rooms were most popular in the lovely Larson House? The McFarland State Bank Dining Room received the most votes and the Larson Family Living Room was second. The Nelson-Helmke-Lokken (octagonal) bedroom was third and the Olson family Master Bedroom just one vote behind. Of course, most of the children preferred the Nelson Children's Bedroom.

WWI Gold Star Mother’s Pilgrimage Project

A mini-grant from the Wisconsin Historical Society and Wisconsin Council for Local History allowed us to digitize rare and fragile artifacts comprising the WWI Gold Star Mother’s Collection and to make them available to everyone on the Recollection Wisconsin website (search for McFarland Historical Society at <https://recollectionwisconsin.org>).

Artifacts in the collection were donated to the society by the families of Mrs. Ole (Mary Lyster) Nelson and Mrs. Theo Edwards, McFarland World War I Gold

Star Mothers who made pilgrimages to their sons’ graves in Europe in 1930. Mrs. Nelson’s travel diary, scrapbook, passport, identity card, photographs, son Helmer’s letters home, and other ephemera are viewable on the site. A newspaper clipping about Mrs. Edward’s trip and a photograph of Alvin Edwards, her son, are also part of the digitized collection.



Armistice Centennial Commemoration

On Sunday, November 11, our society sponsored a special open house to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the signing of the armistice ending World War I and to honor the service and sacrifice of McFarland’s veterans. “Wisconsin in the Great War” and “A Gold Star Mother’s Pilgrimage” were featured exhibits. Visitors were also able to see all areas of the museum, including the log cabin and the early farm display in the annex.

A special presentation conducted by Cindy Clark was held at 2 PM in remembrance of those local soldiers who served their country in 1917 and 1918. About ten family members of different WWI veterans were among the 90 museum guests and each of them shared a small bit of history about their relative’s service. Cindy read a specially prepared Proclamation for Veteran’s Day and veterans Dale Marsden, Rod Clark and Wes Licht from the society’s board of directors took turns reading the names of all 53 McFarland soldiers. This list included Alvin Edwards and Helmer Nelson, who died in service and were buried in France. Bob Kolek and Joe Larson then rang a 21-Bells of Peace salute using the Alsmo family farm bell. After everyone recited the Pledge of Allegiance to a special United States flag, Michael Shumway and Russ Reppen, members of the Edwards–Foye American Legion Post 534, folded this flag which was then presented to our society president Dale Marsden by Post Commander Bill Bley. We thank them for this commemorative gift.

Proclamation for Veteran’s Day 2018

WHEREAS, the tolling of bells is a traditional expression of honor and remembrance; and

WHEREAS, a century ago, 122,000 Wisconsin sons and daughters served our nation and the world in this global conflict known as WWI; and

WHEREAS, many men and women from the village and farmland known as McFarland and the Town of Dunn served selflessly and honorably in military and support roles for their country; and


WHEREAS, there were nearly 4000 Wisconsin soldiers killed in action, including two young men from McFarland, Alvin Edwards and Helmer Nelson; and

WHEREAS, on the 11th hour, of the 11th day, of the 11th month in 1918, an armistice to the fighting was declared; and

WHEREAS, the McFarland Historical Society is dedicating this event to remember those 53 McFarland soldiers in WWI;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT THOSE OF US IN ATTENDANCE DO HONOR THE SACRIFICE AND SERVICE OF ALL MCFARLAND VETERANS on this 100th anniversary of the Armistice with the ringing of the Alsmo family farm bell.
